



- Digital competitions are judged by experts who are not members of the Camera Club of Brevard. 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and Honorable Mention photos will normally be awarded.

# Did you know?



## **Death Valley National Park**



## **iPhone Photography Tips & Tricks**

### 7 tips for iPhone Videography



**Hold it Steady** – Probably the most important iPhone video tip is to keep the phone as steady as possible. The iPhone can take fantastic HD video if it is perfectly still, but if you shake the phone the image quality begins to degrade.

**Use Good Light** - Smartphones can take amazing photos and video, but the light needs to be bright. We've all seen grainy photos and videos from well-meaning folks, so just keep in mind the lighting in most houses alone is not bright enough for crisp photos and video. If you're filming indoors, light it up as much as possible – with lights or even just filming near a sunny window.

**Use the tap to focus feature** - The iPhone does a great job of focusing on near or far objects. Make sure you're focusing on the right subject.

**Don't shoot vertical video** – Video playback is commonly viewed on 16:9 LCD screens. Shoot your videos in the horizonal format to take advantage of the playback screen area.

**Get a diversity of video clips... edit it later.** – Close ups, wide views, video pans work best. Zoom your video by swiping the shutter button while holding it down.

**Get Close** - The bigger your subject in the shot the better. Most iPhone videos are seen on tiny screens. To get the details you have to get close.

**Learn Proper Framing** - This goes for all filmmaking. The rule of thirds is a good starting point. And where the horizon is part of the story, keep it straight!

## 7 Tips for Better Holiday Photos

Can you believe it? The holiday season is just around the corner. For many of us, it marks a time when we capture some pretty special moments with a smartphone or DSLR while we attend traditional religious services, parties and family gatherings. Let's look at a few tips and techniques that we can use to make our photos truly remarkable this year.



- Embrace the low light. With today's DLSR, and even some smartphone camera technology, low light photography is better than ever. Most modern cameras do a fine job of creating a high-quality image even at ISO settings as high as 6400 or even 10,000 on many cameras. And with today's noise reduction post-processing software, you can capture images you never thought possible just a few years ago. Turn your ISO up instead of trying to hand hold a very slow shutter speed. And indoors, turn your flash off to create some of the most remarkable holiday shots. Low incandescent light tends to create a mood your viewers will no doubt enjoy looking at.
- 2. Get Closer Fill the frame with your subject. You don't have to have the entire Christmas Tree in the frame while photographing your niece opening her special present. People like to look at photos where the subject is unmistakable in the picture. Getting in close helps hide all those distractions that pull your viewer out of the photo story too!



3. Get down to the Kids eye level. - Some of the best photos that you will enjoy for years to come are those of children. You will cherish looking at how much they have grown and changed over time. Spend some time with the kids, capturing their excitement and wonder, but do it on their level. Squat down, get on your knees, or sit on the floor to get the best shots of children. Putting yourself on their level offers a more interesting view of their holiday and makes the photo much more personable.



4. Capture the moments as well as the poses - There is certainly nothing wrong with having people pose for a nice picture (see Tip 5). But be sure to capture a few shots of what people are doing like talking, laughing, opening presents, or sharing. The moments you capture can often be much more interesting, preserving those special moments for years to come.




- 5. Take the Group Shot I am a big advocate of getting the whole family in a group shot. It's a tradition in my family. Some of our most cherished family photos are those taken of the entire group more than 50 years ago. Most of those in the old photos are no longer with us but those photos bring us back to the memories we have of them. A lot of family pictures come and go but I find a large group shot seems to find its way into photo albums and frames, preserving our memories for a lifetime. Line up the entire group and have them do something funny or stand in a random pattern interacting with one another. Some of the best group shots break all the rules of posing. Put your camera on a tripod and get in the photo!
- 6. Give a gift of a photograph Print your favorite photos and give them to friends and family as holiday gifts. In this digital age, we share our photos online, but rarely look at them more than once. A print is permanent. Frame it or put it in a magnet frame for the refrigerator. You will be surprised how appreciative people are of your thoughtful gift. Our family tradition is to take the entire family group shot on Thanksgiving. My favorite shot then goes in a Photographer's Edge (<u>www.photographersedge.com</u>) magnet calendar and everyone in the family gets one as a Christmas gift. They all end up on each family member's refrigerator and are there all year long.
- 7. Put the Camera Down This may sound funny coming from a Tips of better Holiday Photos Article, but there comes a time in every holiday get-together to just be with friends and family. After all, how many photos do you need of your family opening presents. Rather than taking dozens of images, be intentional in the photos you take. Then put the camera down and enjoy the love and fellowship.
