MESSAGE FROM The President



What is Disruptive Innovation?

Disruptive innovation is innovation that simplifies and makes more affordable products and services to underserviced or ignored markets. An example of disruptive innovation is the introduction of digital music downloads, which have, by far, replaced compact discs (that in-turn, replaced the vinal LP albums). Amazon restructured the bookselling industry by creating an online bookstore and eliminating the need for expensive real estate. Netflix completely eliminated the DVD/CD rental business through the power of the internet.

The CCB is proud to have Steven J Sasson, retired Kodak research engineer as our guest speaker via ZOOM for our March meeting. The topic for the evening is "Disruptive Innovation: The Story of the First Digital Camera". The creation of the first digital camera prototype in 1975 at the Eastman Kodak Company will be discussed as well as how the concept was demonstrated within Kodak during the following year. Subsequent technical innovations with megapixel imagers, image compression products in the mid 1980's, and the early commercialization of professional and consumer digital still cameras in the early 1990's will be discussed. The internal Kodak reaction to these developments will be highlighted as well as some of the learned observations about how to deal with disruptive innovation within an established corporate environment will be shared.

This program is a monumental event and achievement for our camera club and is made possible by contacts I have with friends at Kodak. It promises to be a memorable evening! Mr Sasson is graciously forgoing any fee for his time. At his suggestion, the CCB will be donating the standard appearance fee to the Technology Collection at the George Eastman Museum of Photography in Rochester, New York. THIS MONTH'S MEETING: March 2024

HAVE YOU SEEN AN ECLIPSE LATELY? ARE YOU FREE ON APRIL 8TH?



The Monday, April 8, 2024, total solar eclipse will cross North America, passing over Mexico, the United States, and Canada. The total solar eclipse will begin over the South Pacific Ocean. Weather permitting, the first location in continental North America that will experience totality is Mexico's Pacific coast at around 11:07 a.m. PDT.

The path of the eclipse continues from Mexico, entering the United States in Texas, and traveling through Oklahoma, Arkansas, Missouri, Illinois, Kentucky, Indiana, Ohio, Pennsylvania, New York, Vermont, New Hampshire, and Maine. Small parts of Tennessee and Michigan will also experience the total solar eclipse. The eclipse will enter Canada in Southern Ontario, and continue through Quebec, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island, and Cape Breton. The eclipse will exit continental North America on the Atlantic coast of Newfoundland, Canada, at 5:16 p.m. NDT.





TIPS to becoming a better photographer!

Have you mentored a new CCB member lately?

Last month we discussed the exposure triangle . . . the photography axiom that three variables controlled by the photographer will not only bring you a properly exposed image, but with the correct balancing of these three factors (shutter speed, aperture, and ISO), the photographer can significantly influence how the image will turn out (sharp vs blurry, deep vs shallow depth of field, etc). We can balance all these factors perfectly, and still have a boring photograph (albeit a perfectly exposed one). This month, let's talk a bit on arranging components in your image to make it interesting as well!



Let's talk about the "Rule of Thirds" . . . another photography axiom often used to help photographers. Simply stated, this "rule" implies than every photograph should be split into thirds, both horizontally and vertically, and then the photographer should compose their image to place the subject or the prominent subjects in their image at the intersection of these points. Many cameras even have the option of a "rule of thirds" overlay in their viewfinder to help in identifying these points and placing their subjects accordingly.

Our eyes (meaning our brains) tend to gravitate to specific points, most often 1/3 of the way in from the edges. In the example above, the person is very near the lower/left point, and the pier hut is generally clustered around the upper/left point. These points are not hard and fast, but rather guides. Notice the horizon and ship are not dead center, but rather along the top third line. This is a corollary to the rule. Divide your image into thirds and use these 1/3 lines when a horizon or elongated subject cannot be easily placed at a single point. When the horizon is along the top third line, the foreground portion will demand the attention of the viewer. If the horizon is along the bottom third line, then the sky will draw the attention of the viewer.

These "rules" can be used as general guidance when composing your images. We have all experienced that snapshot of a friend or family member standing rigidly, smack in the center of a picture. If you off-set the subject (vertically and/or horizontally) and have them look slightly towards the wider area of your image, the image will be much better.

The zoom on your lens can help in your composure. But don't let the zoom feature make you lazy! Zoom with your feet and you will notice how relative sizes change and subjects change in proportion to the entire shot. Move left or right to "place" your subject in a better place relative to the background or other supporting components in the shot. Many of our images also seem to be taken from eye level (for some reason). Try squatting down, or holding your camera high over your head. Different perspectives (high/low, left/right, closer/farther) all contribute significantly to improve your composure choices.

Lastly, even though you use these axioms to help in taking your pictures, don't discount the wise use of appropriate cropping when doing your post processing!

- 2. Leveraging Manual Controls with Third-Party Apps
- Discover the benefits of manual controls for focus and exposure through apps like Halide or ProCamera, offering DSLR-like control over your images.

Sophisticated Composition Techniques

- 1. Elevating Composition
- Challenge conventional composition rules. Experiment with asymmetry, abstract framing, and disruptive angles to create visually arresting images.
- Use environmental elements like reflections, shadows, or architectural lines to add depth and intrigue to your compositions.
- 2. Innovative Perspectives
- Change your physical perspective—climb higher, go lower, or shoot through objects to find unique viewpoints that transform ordinary scenes into extraordinary photographs.

iPhone Photography for Intermediate and Experienced Photographers (continued)

Maximizing Camera Modes

- 1. Deep Dive into Shooting Modes
- In Portrait mode, experiment with different lighting effects and understand how to modify depth-of-field post-shooting for striking portraits.
- Utilize Panorama mode in tight urban spaces or for creative distortions, not just for wide scenic landscapes.
- 2. Advanced Video Capabilities
- Embrace the full power of 4K video. Experiment with different frame rates to capture high-quality slow-motion videos or crisp, action-packed footage.

Mastering Focus and Exposure

- 1. Precision with Manual Focus
- Use manual focus for macro shots or when dealing with challenging lighting, ensuring your subject is always sharp.
- Familiarize yourself with reading and using the histogram for precise exposure, avoiding overexposed highlights or underexposed shadows.
- 2. Expert Exposure Control
- Experiment with HDR and Smart HDR to balance high-contrast scenes, ensuring details are preserved in both bright and dark areas.

Professional-Level Photo Editing

- 1. Utilizing Advanced Editing Tools
- Dive deeper into the Photos app, exploring curves for fine-tuning brightness and contrast, and color balance for achieving the perfect mood.
- Use professional-grade apps like Snapseed or Adobe Lightroom for comprehensive control over your edits, from selective adjustments to detailed color grading.
- 2. Creating a Signature Style
- Develop a consistent editing style to establish a unique photographic identity. This could be a particular color scheme, mood, or theme that makes your work instantly recognizable.

Embrace the journey of learning in photography. Each new feature and technique offers an opportunity to expand your creative vision. Remember, great photography is not just about technical mastery but also about the story you tell and the emotions you evoke.
